1 Chronicles 29:11-16; Job 1:21; Psalm 24:1; Psalm 50:9-12; Ecclesiastes 5:15; Haggai 2:8; 1 Timothy 6:7

If God owns everything, that makes us not owners, but stewards. This makes a fundamental difference to the way we approach our possessions, our lifestyle, and our giving.

- 7. Read 1 Timothy 6:17-18. What are the benefits of being rich in good deeds and generous to others?
